CDR Maguire continues tradition of service following expansion



Did you see that Pennsylvania has a new travel and tourism slogan? The Governor announced it late last month over in Scranton and they took off on a week-long trip to help in promoting it. Just in case you missed it, the new slogan is "The Great American Getaway". It's not bad and I think better than the previous one it replaces, "Pursue Your Happiness".

"The Great American Getaway" is now the latest in a string of tourism slogans for the commonwealth. These include, "The State of Independence", the controversial "America Starts Here", "Pennsylvania Memories Last a Lifetime, and my favorite "You've Got a Friend in Pennsylvania" which ran from 1980 to 1988. As noted, the "America Starts Here" slogan was rather controversial with a number of people, especially historians and those who live in Delaware. Our neighbors to the southeast in Delaware were quick to note that it joined the Union 5 days prior to Pennsylvania's ratification of it in December 1787. Who would have thought that this would cause such turmoil in the state slogan world?

Grammar apparently is also rather important when coming up with a slogan. I mentioned that "You've Got a Friend in Pennsylvania" was my personal favorite. This was the slogan from 1980 to 1988. There are still people to this day that think it's still our slogan and for good reason. It was catchy, likeable and downright friendly. Everything that you want in a tourism slogan. The only hitch, it's not grammatically correct. To be correct, it should have been "You Have a Friend..." or "You Got a Friend...". So instead of just making the edit, we threw the baby out with the bathwater and moved to a series of some nice to poor slogans. If you don't like this slogan, you'll most likely get a chance to see a new one in either 3 to 7 years when we elect a new Governor.

It would be remiss of me to not note a couple of other items of news in the past days and weeks. We finally have restored air service back to Williamsport. Yes, I know that there are people out there who will downplay this and chastise those involved with getting what we now have for people who choose to fly from here. To those that cite either wasted spending on the new airport terminal or that we don't have the same service we had when American or US Air was here, please understand that the decisions that were made at the time by those in charge at the airport authority, county, state and federal levels did so prior to Covid. If Covid never occurred, I feel very confident in saying that we would not have lost service as we did for almost 3 years. No one could foresee a pandemic occurring that would drastically change the way air service is conducted here in this country and globally. A major factor among several was the decision by the airlines to pay early retirement packages to their pilots. This shortsighted decision is still having major affects on the industry as it works to rebound from the pandemic.

Those speaking negatively about this service don't appreciate that a significant number of small airports have been affected by a total loss of service or a drop in number of flights and or carriers. We're fortunate to now have something in place that we can build upon with Southern Airways. This is just a beginning of restoring service, not an end. While it would have been great to get service back at pre-pandemic levels, people need to understand that it's just not realistic to think that was going to happen. You either take what you can get and continue to work and improve your situation, or sit back and complain and harken back to what we used to have for air service.

A couple of changes at key institutions were announced here in the past week. The first was Pat Wilson being selected to succeed Steve Keener as the President/CEO of Little League Baseball. I'm happy for Pat, Steve and our community in this selection. Steve has worked with Pat for many years and knows that the greatest youth sports program for girls and boys is entrusted in competent and capable hands. It's good to have someone like Pat at the helm with vast local ties to the community. As a note, the evening this was announced, Pat could be seen at Williamsport High School watching the Poptastik concert with his family.

It was also great to see the news about Bob Rolley, John Leeser and Anthony Segraves. Bob has earned his retirement and I'm very happy that he's now able to step away and let two long-standing team members step up and take the reins. John and Anthony have been with the Sun-Gazette for many years and will serve the paper and community well for several more years.

Before I close out this month, I need to say how happy I am that we are beginning another season of Williamsport Crosscutters baseball. What a treat we have to head to such a beautiful ballpark to watch America's pastime. The team at the Crosscutters does a phenomenal job in all the ancillary activities in addition to the game being played on the field. If you're looking for something relaxing to do, be sure to get over to the ballpark to catch one of their games this season.

CDR Maguire continues tradition of service following expansion

Founded in 1939, CDR Maguire has made its name as one of the leading consulting firms in the infrastructure support industry, a position it maintains as it continues to expand.

In 2022, the company purchased McTish, Kunkel and Associates (MKA), a longtime construction consulting organization, and set up a central Pennsylvania office in the former company's Pine Street office space, said Wayne Swinehart Jr., Operations Manager for the site.

"I started here in early July of last year, following the acquisition of McTish," Swinehart explained. "I already had a job, but it seemed like a good challenge and a good opportunity to help this grow."

"I've been really working on getting the word out that we're still here," he said. "This is the same company that it's been. Minus a few people that we brought in, this is the same staff that's still capable of handling all the things that were in the past."

The purchase of McTish was an attempt to expand CDR McGuire's services statewide, according to Swinehart.

"At the time, CDR McGuire had offices, in our engineering division, in Pittsburgh and Mechanicsburg, so this was a good opportunity for us to provide support across the state for all of our clients and all the industries as well, because McTish was mostly focused on eastern Pennsylvania, with offices here and in Allentown," Swinehart explained.

Parent company CDR Companies also has offices in Boston, Providence and Fort Lauderdale, with corporate offices in Miami, and has companies in the health industry, emergency services and laboratory services to name a few.

"CDR Engineering is a division of CDR Companies, and if I were to break our work into three categories, it would be transportation, construction and inspection, and civil site design," Swinehart explained.

"A majority of the work at this office and our Allentown and Pittsburgh/Warrendale offices is in transportation," he said.

"That includes highways, roadways, the turnpike, and a lot of PennDOT work. We provide survey engineering, design of bridges and the roadways themselves. We also do environmental work from permitting to wetland delineations, and we do construction inspection and construction management," Swinehart said.

"As far as oil and gas, we focus mainly on civil design and stormwater, with a focus on survey and environmental as well," he added.

"It's how it goes in the consulting world. There's an opportunity to do as many things as you can to support industries and obviously focus on certain areas."

Swinehart looks at the company's diverse set of disciplines as one of its strongest assets.

"You can do a lot of things right in house, instead of having to subcontract or find other companies to partner with, which still do occasionally," Swinehart said.

CDR Maguire's clientele includes not only PennDOT and municipalities, but also individuals and other companies.

"We do site development work, which includes making sure that all their permits are into DEP and basically taking care of the front end side to get the project set for them to start construc-

Happy Acres Resort an 'outdoor lovers paradise'

Nestled in the hills of Waterville, lies Happy Acres Resort, a 60 acre haven where rustic camping meets all the comforts of a modern home.

"It started in the late sixties, and I bought it 20 years ago," Gene Feerrar, who owns the resort with his wife, Irene, said.

"In 1991, I purchased my vacation home three miles from here, and Happy Acres was open, but it went bankrupt, and kept sitting, and I kept thinking, 'this area needs lodging because there wasn't any,'" he explained.

"Of course, it didn't look like this. It was a rundown property, and so there's been millions spent on redoing things," he said.

The improvements made by the couple include upgrading the electric and septic systems and paving the roads.

All told, the resort, which is pet friendly and open year round, boasts around 200 sites, ranging from high end cabins and primitive tent sites. The cabins can accommodate anywhere from four to 25 people.

"We have a lot of permanent campers and some people have their own cabins here, too,"

Gene said. "For some people, this is their vacation spot."

Each cabin comes with a grill and all the amenities of a home, including a fully stocked kitchen, air conditioning, DirectTV and WiFi, and even jacuzzis.

"You just bring your food and clothes and you're good to go," Gene said.

"People come here and say that it's nicer than their homes," he said. "And they're not on top of each other, so people have privacy."

"We found a really beautiful area for people, with the state park and Pine Creek Rail Trail nearby, and they have the lake for fishing and hunting. It's just wonderful," Gene said.

The Resort also sells propane and wood, and has facilities for doing laundry and showering.

"Whatever people need, we have it," Gene said.

The property is also host to a game barn, a swimming pool, and a large number of activities including a frisbee golf course, horseshoes, basketball, pool, shuffleboard and Foolsball. Many of the cabins even come ready with at least one of those options.

Service 1st Federal Credit Union announced a new branch location will be coming to Muncy later this year. The future 4,200-square-foot Muncy location, at 200 Muncy Creek Boulevard, will include three Interactive Teller Machines (ITMs) and a teller pod, where members can complete transactions.

"We are looking forward to welcoming

members to our new location in Muncy in the fall of this year," said Mike Thomas, President/CEO, Service 1st. "The ITMs will provide us with the flexibility to better serve our members' ever-changing needs by combining our digital first focus with the personal service they've come to expect from our team."

The Muncy office will be the first of the credit union's branch locations to fully integrate ITMs. An ITM can be described as a

customary Automated Teller Machine (ATM), with the capability to provide additional products and services to members as well as allow them to interact through live, video chats with member service representatives. Two of the ITMs will be in the drive-up area.

"Many people have grown comfortable with video communication in recent years, and this technology will allow us to connect with our members in an exciting new way," said Linda Brown, Chief Administrative Of-

ficer, Service 1st. "No matter how members decide to interact with the Service 1st team in the future, it will be the exceptional experience they've come to expect."

T-Ross Brothers Construction has been selected as the contractor. Service 1st currently has 11 locations, in Bloomsburg, Danville, Elysburg, Lewisburg, Loyalsock, Mifflinburg, Montandon, Shamokin Dam, Sunbury and Wilkes-Barre. For more information, visit service1.org or call 800-562-6049.

event, according to the couple.

"We have a lot of class reunions, family reunions and weddings," Gene said. "We have a beautiful covered bridge that people walk across and then get married on the other side."

And just down the road from the camping area, sits the expansive Happy Acres Restaurant, which also sees its fair share of bookings for various events. The restaurant seats a couple hundred people, Gene said.

And right next door is the camping store, with a large variety of camping essentials and Happy Acres apparel.

Word of all the camp has to offer has spread far and wide, according to Irene.

"We've had people from the U.K. here, and in August, there's the Eastern States 100 race, and I believe we had a gentleman from Japan that was here for that," she said.

One of the keys to success for the couple is providing their patrons with a hands-on approach to booking their stay.

"We don't want people to come in and say, 'oh, this cabin just doesn't suit our plans,'" Irene said.

"Our reservation staff will kind of screen people just to pick their brains as far as why they're coming and who they're bringing, how many pets, that sort of stuff, and find out which cabin they would fit best. It's a very personalized experience," she said.

Resort options, pricing and availability can be previewed on its website, but reservations must be made through the office staff. Interested parties must be at least 18 to rent a campsite, and 21 or older to

rent a cabin.

For Irene, the appeal of the resort boils down to giving people a low key escape from the busyness of everyday life. "We're not commercial-

ized, so we're very family friendly," she said. "We're not rowdy, we have games and things like that, but we have families that basically come and enjoy each other."


"We are very much an outdoor lovers paradise, because you have so much to do in the area with the streams and the lake and the bike trail and there's marked hiking trails all

around our resort," Irene said. "We're surrounded by state game land, so there's hunting, fishing, all that," she continued.

"I think the biggest draw

And, while Swinehart said there is much respect and friendship among the various companies within the industry, there are factors that set CDR Maguire apart from the others. "Where I think we have an advantage is we have a long standing business here. We were founded here, essentially," he said. "What we did was we brought in that small company feel with a big company backing, so where I think we like to separate ourselves is with our understanding and capability of supporting our clients," he continued.

But for Swinehart such a long process really pays off once the project has reached completion. "It's very rewarding when you see this stuff on a screen in a two dimensional view, or just lines on a paper, but then when you can go back maybe a year or more later and see the product that you worked on for a significant amount of time there in front of you. It's such a neat thing to see."

Among the projects the company has supported is the CSVT project in the Lewisburg area and the Market Street Bridge.



The Williamsport Regional Airport is proud to announce that commercial air service to the Williamsport / Lycoming County region, as well as surrounding counties has officially begun with the inaugural Southern Airways Express flight from Dulles International Airport landing at 9:36am at terminal at 724 Airport Rd., Montoursville, PA, on Thursday, May 21st, 2024.

The Southern Airways Express flight to and from Dulles International will restart service to the regional airport with two daily flights to Washington Dulles (IAD) and features seamless connections worldwide, quick TSA screening, and access to the New Metro Service from IAD to downtown Washington DC. Flights can be booked through: iFlySouthern.com for Southern Airways and three major carriers, United.com, American Airlines - AA.com, & AlaskaAir.com.

In addition to the excellent small airport service and convenience the IPT terminal has free parking for passengers flying out of the airport.

“Convenience and accessibility are two major factors with this service,” states Richard Howell, the Airport Director. “When you arrive its a very short walk from our parking area right into the terminal. Check in and TSA screening is very short and easy. There are no long lines for boarding and the experience is very similar to flying in a private aircraft environment. Additionally, there is no long commute to an out-of-area airport that factors in traffic, road construction, difficult and expensive parking and potentially needing a hotel for early morning flights.”

The Southern flight inbound to IPT took less than an hour, despite the airline website estimate of 1 hour and 34 minutes and Chamber President/CEO Jason Fink said “Flying on the smaller plane was incredibly tranquil, not a lot of chatter or anxious flyers.... I felt like I chartered my own flight. For future flights the ease of Williamsport’s check in, TSA at a smaller Airport really saves time and headaches, plus there won’t be long lines or inconvenient check-in.”

Lycoming County Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund

The Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) provides low-interest loans to developers and grants to non-profits and local governments for the cleanup of contaminated sites.



RLF Overview

The Lycoming County Revolving Loan Fund Program, funded by an \$800,000 U.S. EPA award, makes loans and grants available for site remediation and subsequent redevelopment. The goal of the program is to return Lycoming County Brownfield sites to productive use. Lycoming County has lead a brownfield program since 2005 and has inventoried over 80 sites and conducted over 30 site assessments through its program.

Acceptable Use of Funds

- Cleanup of hazardous substances and/or the mitigation of threatened release of hazardous substances
- Preparation of Remedial Action Workplans
- Construction of a site's engineered remediation cap which could include foundations/ roadways
- Demolition of structures to the extent that the demolition is integral to accessing contamination
- Site monitoring and data collection

Terms and Conditions

- Grants available for municipal and non-profit entities
- Loans for private entities
- Low interest rates and flexible repayment terms determined on a case-by-case basis
- All sites and work subject to EPA approval and site cleanups overseen by PA DEP Act 2 Program
- Davis Bacon Act wage rates, wage notices, and payroll required
- No-prepayment penalties
- 20% match requirement
