From Jason's Desk

Not sure about you, but when I hit November, I really start to take notice about how fast the year has gone by. This year I can say the same. Looking ahead, November and December are usually the shortest months in terms of working days, yet seem to have the most work that needs to get accomplished before yearend. My guess is that most people working on a calendar cycle experience the same, so we're probably all in a similar boat.

The airport continues to be a topic that people continue to engage me in discussion. If you get a chance to catch the Ted Minier show on WILQ the last Thursday of the month, you hear Ted mention it to me just about every time I'm on with him. He expresses the frustration that many, including myself, have about the situation without an existing carrier flying from Williamsport.

This is something that I know the director at the airport is fully aware of and believe he's most likely the most frustrated of all of us given his years in the industry. We're in a position that, prior to Covid, none of us thought we would be sitting here. February of 2020, we learned that American Airlines was going to begin service to Charlotte on jets. This was something that the business community in particular was happy to see given the greater connectivity out of Charlotte. In August, they actually started the service and from there, we all know

what has happened with the last commercial flights from Williamsport occurring now over a year ago.

The industry continues to see those 50 seat jets being parked in the desert with a move to larger planes from regional airports requiring fewer daily flights. This is primarily being driven by the lack of pilots, which was driven in part by the industry furloughing and encouraging retirements for those in positions to take.

We're seeing a significant pullback by the main carriers in servicing the industry, with 72% of US airports having substantially less air service today than before the pandemic, despite rising passenger demand. The pilot shortage is compounding the situation.

Communities like Williamsport are losing air service due to the shortage of airline pilots. There aren't enough pilots to meet forecasted demand for air travel. As a result, airports across the country, especially in small communities, have faced dramatic air service loss that worsened during this past summer travel season. Air service loss imparts devastating consequences on the economies of these communities and diminishes the quality of life for residents. We conducted over this summer, with the Department of Community and Economic Development, a site consultant familiarization tour. The site consultants were very impressed with our market in terms of existing industry and support

available for them. Their only issue was the lack of air service here to Williamsport.

An interesting note is that domestic demand has met or exceeded 2019 levels, yet the majority (72%) of US air service receive less air service today than before the pandemic. The Official Airline Guide (OAG) schedule comparisons between third quarter of 2019 and third quarter of 2022, show that 332 airports have experienced reduced departures. The average service reduction across these airports is 22.4%, and 125 airports have lost more than 25 percent of their air service. Nine airports have lost all their scheduled, commercial air service. The pilot shortage factors largely in most of this air service contraction.

The pilot shortage is a major problem, and growing worse. Large air carriers expect to hire more than 13,000 pilots over the course of this year, yet FAA issued an average of just 6,335 new ATP/RATP certificates per year since 2013. Pandemic forces slowed this further, with fewer than 5,000 new ATP/RATP pilots certified in 2021. Major airlines primarily hire from smaller, regional air carriers, which provide the only source of air service to more than two-thirds of the country – communities too small to support air service by the major airlines. With far too few new pilots being produced to replace those hired by bigger carriers, worsening air service losses will be most acute at regional

airports and smaller communities.

The Chamber is committed to advocating for our community in whatever manner is needed to help the Williamsport Regional Airport gain service for our market. This is why we've signed on to become part of a larger nationwide effort by communities similarly impacted by loss or reduced levels of service. Rally for Air Service is being coordinated to help in getting one of the key challenges

being faced at this point with the lack of pilots to fly the planes which currently sit in the desert. As we begin to engage with this effort, there will be a need for the business and general community to work with us in helping to advocate for this position. Having heard from a number of you already, I know we'll have the support in working on this issue, and thank you in advance for your assistance in the effort.

Storage business born out of necessity thrives 20 years later

Being a business owner means taking ideas and turning them into opportunities.

Mike Philbin, a longtime entrepreneur, has used that concept with his commercial enterprises.

Muncy Self Storage, 1603 John Brady Drive, Muncy, was launched 20 years ago out of a personal need.

“How this all started out was, I was building a house,” he recalled. “The first thing you want to do is declutter your house. All the storage places were full.”

Philbin, already the owner and operator of Keystone Bingo in Muncy Township, saw an opportunity on some unused land next door.

“I just couldn’t find a space to rent. That’s why got me started in the business,” he said.

He decided to erect some buildings and rent them out for people who needed a place to store their items.

More than two decades later, the business is continuing to grow.

“It’s a fenced in facility,” he said. “I wanted to make sure people who rent here have their stuff safe.”

Philbin’s son, Jason, helps him run the business.

During a recent tour of the sprawling site, the father and son, showed off some of the different units they rent out for storage.

People need storage for household furnishings, large items, or just about anything, including vehicles. They include folks in the process of moving from one home to another in need of temporary space for their belongings.

The units vary in size to accommodate different needs. Some are even climate controlled.

“We are planning on building four additional buildings,” Jason said.

“We are probably 90 percent full.”

Mike said, "It's probably been that way for two years. It's tough to say why. People go through lifestyle changes and need places to put their stuff."

And if they don't have space for someone, they are happy to refer them elsewhere.

He figures about 90 percent of people who rent space at his facility live within three to five miles of his business.

Individuals, families, and all different kinds of businesses need storage space, he noted.

In addition to rental units, Muncy Self Storage includes a large fenced-in lot for safe keeping of recreational vehicles, campers, and other large vehicles.

Mike said perhaps the most challenging aspect of the business is the decision-making process, such as when to expand or grow it.

He said Muncy Township officials have been good to work with over the years as he's grown the business.

Mike got his first taste of business through his family.

"I worked for my parents' shop in the Loyal Plaza – the Vanity Shop. My father was in business for a lot of years," he said. "I ended up leaving the business because I thought I knew a lot more than he did."

With a laugh, he realizes now those were youthful misconceptions, that in fact, he learned a lot from his father.

Mike eventually went into the bingo business and later launched Keystone Advertising.

He's glad, he said, to have different business enterprises and be self-employed.

"Being an entrepreneur is the best job in the world," he said. "If I don't work hard and don't make any money, it's on me. You control your own destiny."

The storage business has been good for his whole family, he added.

Celebration Villa – a legacy among personal care communities

When considering a personal care home, Celebration Villa of Loyalsock has a lot going for it.

This month's Legacy story of the Williamsport/Lycoming Chamber of Commerce has been established for 19 years.

Located at 2985 Four Mile Drive in Montoursville despite the Loyalsock Township name, Celebration Villa of Loyalsock specializes as a personal care community.

The name Celebration tells much of what guests choosing to live here can anticipate.

Jenn Miller, the facility executive director/personal care home administrator, recently shared all the facility offers.

First, those reading might remember Outlook Point, which transitioned over to Elmcroft and in November 2021 became Celebration Villa of Loyalsock.

With a staff consisting of about 30 employees the personal care touch is a consistent commitment.

Among these professionals includes three licensed practical nurses who are on staff and there is also a nurse on call at all times.

When asked why should individuals or families consider living here or sending their loved ones to Celebration Villa the answer was easy for Miller.

"We have six levels of care and that's not just for those who are independent but also somebody who may need some extra help with care such as individuals who are in a wheelchair or those who may have to use a walker," Miller said.

Currently, the facility has 47 guests in house and the facility is licensed for 90, she said.

The living arrangements consist of studio and two-bedroom apartments.

Some of the two-bedroom apartments are currently occupied by one individual guest.

Asked what the typical day is like for the guests, Miller said it begins with a morning wake up and breakfast at 8 a.m. to 9 a.m.

That is followed by a wide range of activities such as physical or exercising and/or



mental exercise through games like Bingo followed by a social hour and then happy hour and a nutritious lunch afterwards.

Following the afternoon meal, the guests typically either wind down, chat a bit and go to their physical therapy sessions or enjoy other activities such as games or watching television.

Dinner is served at 5:00 p.m. By 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. most of the guests are settling down and preparing for their nightly rest.

Celebration Villa of Loyalsock holds community activities and celebrates all the holidays.

A trunk or treat was held before Halloween and friends and family gather for Thanksgiving dinner In December, Christmas and other holidays may be observed for those who participate.

Hotel Kast keeps historic charm with modern updates

The Hotel Kast, located at 723 Arch St., Williamsport, has been in operation since 1887.

The bar and restaurant hotel has been owned and operated by brothers Kevin and Shawn Pequignot since 2011.

“I always refer to it as the modern day Cheers,” Keven Pequignot, Owner of The Hotel Kast said. “I’ve got to know a lot of good people throughout the years,” he added.

The bar and restaurant has a full menu with a variety of options including sandwiches, baskets, soups, salads, pastas, desserts and more.

“We do have a full menu with pretty much a little bit of everything. We have specials that are different every week,” Pequignot said.

The historical building was built in 1860 and was first used as a general store by Daniel Hurr and a cobblers shop by Pat Carey.

Later Alfred Bastian Kast rented and operated the building as the “Old Homestead Hotel” for four years. In 1887, he purchased the building and renamed it “The Arch Street Hotel.”

He ran the Hotel until 1896, when his son-in-law, Edward H. Kast became the proprietor, according to a written history of the building.


The hotel stayed within the Kast family until 2011, when it was bought by the Pequignot brothers.

“It’s always been in the Kast family. We are the first outside of the Kasts since 1887. It’s always been the same family, for generations,” Pequignot said.

Although the building’s historic charm remains, the two brothers have done renovations on the building since buying it in 2011.

The hotel’s rooms all have newly renovated bathrooms.

They also added a patio with outdoor seating which is widely known and referred to as the “OutKast area,” where customers

can sit and enjoy the outdoor atmosphere.

The Hotel Kast will be throwing a Halloween party on Oct. 28 from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. with music by DJ Bean. Customers attending are encouraged to dress up.

Like many other local businesses, The Hotel Kast is currently looking for employees.


“We are short on help right now. It’s tough. It’s a struggle for everybody right now,” Pequignot said.






